RE: End of the Year Allocation

At our July meeting, the Board votes on percentages to invest the previous fiscal year's net revenue. We are fortunate to have a history of strong financial performance. These investments are expressed as percentages, since it takes several closes to determine the final net position of the organization. Lauren Weaver will present the first close, but there are usually four closes to get to the final number. When that final number is determined, we apply the percentages that the Board approves.

The following percentages are recommendations to the Board.

70% - Capital Budget. These resources can help us accomplish some of our ambitious capital projects. Every year, we also have a long list of what we call 'capital-maintenance.' These projects repair and improve existing facilities, doing things like replacing roofs, windows, and siding of older buildings, and replacing equipment. With a park system that is over 60 years old, such regular upgrades are essential to serve the public well.

20% - Performance Bonuses. This is the one area that is set by Board Policy. Every full-time employee has goals that go beyond just doing a good job and help us achieve our strategic and facility goals. If an employee achieves their goals, they are eligible for shares of this bonus pool. This system puts a significant focus on goals and acts like profit sharing or an employee-owned business. Even part-time employees who have worked for us for six months and are employed when bonuses are distributed in late October are eligible to participate.

10% - Retirement Plan. Our plan is well managed. However, with considerable market volatility over the last year, additional contributions help to reduce long-term costs for the organization. Every end-of-the-year contribution reduces the amount of payroll contribution that is needed on an ongoing basis.

Recommendation:

I move that we allocate the net revenue from FY'2024 in the following way: 70% to the Capital Fund, 20% to the performance bonus pool, and 10% to the retirement plan.

Subject: Amendment to Retirement Plan

The Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority Retirement Plan provides a contribution to health insurance premiums for those retirees enrolled in one of the group health insurance plans offered by NOVA Parks. This benefit includes a premium cap to help control the insurance contribution costs. This cap is increased annually by 4%. The retirement plan document currently states that this annual increase takes place on July 1 of each year. The amendment to the retirement plan will change the timing to "January 1 of each year, or such other date as the Authority determines is appropriate" to align with current practices.

FIFTH AMENDMENT TO

NORTHERN VIRGINA REGIONAL PARK AUTHORITY RETIREMENT PLAN (AS AMENDED AND RESTATED EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2015)

THIS FIFTH AMENDMENT is made by the Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority (the "Authority") to the Northern Virgina Regional Park Authority Retirement Plan, as amended and restated as of July 1, 2015 (the "Plan").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Authority maintains the Plan for the exclusive benefit of certain employees of the Authority; and

WHEREAS, the Authority deems it advisable and in the best interests of the Authority to amend the Plan to clarify how premium caps are determined.

NOW THEREFORE, effective as of January 1, 2025, the Plan is hereby amended as follows:

1. Article VII, Section I.3.c.ii.(C) is amended and restated to read in its entirety as follows:

(C) Cap on Monthly Base Premium – The maximum premiums on which contributions from the Plan may be computed are: individual coverage-\$782.30; and two party/family coverage-\$1,564.59. For coverage effective January 1 of each year, or such other date as the Authority determines is appropriate, caps shall be increased by four percent (4%) over the previous amounts, with the first increase to be computed with respect to coverage effective on January 1, 2026. From time to time, the Authority may, but shall not be required to, make further adjustments in the caps, to maintain health premium contributions current with increasing health costs.

Ms. Howze reviewed the timeline and process for interviewing and recruiting an Executive Director. She explained they will make a semi-finalist report by mid-June and she will meet with the hiring committee in the week of June 23rd to further explain the next steps in more detail.

Ms. Howze left the meeting at the end of this discussion

Mr. Baldino and Mr. Gilbert led the discussion on who was available for the upcoming interviews.

FY2026 Operating Budget Approval Patrick Wells

Mr. Wells said that there were no significant changes from the budget presented at the previous Board meeting. Minor updates are as follows:

The final retirement contribution rate of 21.22% is slightly lower than the 22.3% rate included in the Proposed Budget. It is recommended to keep the 22.3% rate in the budget.

The Proposed Budget includes \$65,000 in Compensation Funding Initiatives in the event the minimum wage was increased in the State of Virginia.

Contingency in the FY 2026 Proposed Budget remains at \$275,000, an increase of \$125,000 from the FY 2025 Budget.

Mr. Chandler made a motion to adopt the FY 2026 Operating Budget in the amount of \$41,143,743, with an Enterprise Fund of \$35,149,351 and General Fund of \$5,994,392.

Mr. Nardolilli seconded **Unanimously approved**

Mr. Nardolilli made a motion that the Board adopt the FY 26 Budget as presented for the Restricted License Fee Fund and the Carlyle House Friends Budget

Ms. Koch seconded

Unanimously approved

Goals and Retirement Party for the current Executive Director

Mr. Gilbert explained that due to his approaching retirement, he would not be setting updated annual goals but would continue to work on the strategic plan goals and help with the transition with the new Executive Director.

<u>Update – W&OD Visitor Center</u>

Mr. Gilbert updated the Board on the plan to build a Visitor Center for the W&OD trail in Vienna next to the Town Green. He explained that Vienna may purchase the property and lease it back to NOVA Parks. He then discussed possible funding options to build the Center. The next step will be joint planning with the town of Vienna for the Visitor Center and dual trails.

Ms. Koch made a motion to approve the recommendation to design the W&OD Visitor Center to cost between \$2.5 and \$4.5 million, using the Strategic Opportunity Reserve plus annual proceeds from the Capital Endowment.



ABOUT NOVA PARKS

In the late 1950's, the Northern Virginia Planning District Commission and a group of citizens from several local jurisdictions came together to protect Northern Virginia's rich heritage of woods, meadows, lakes and streams from the threat of suburban sprawl. These citizens, working with their local governments--Fairfax County, Arlington County and the City of Falls Church--organized under the Virginia Park Authorities Act in 1959 as the Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority (NVRPA). They came together to plan, acquire develop and operate a system of regional parks for all Northern Virginians to enjoy.

Today, NOVA Parks (as the organization came to be known in 2014) represents three counties and three cities -- Arlington County, Fairfax County, Loudoun County, the City of Alexandria, the City of Falls Church and the City of Fairfax. NOVA Parks staff, volunteer board members appointed from each jurisdiction and many friends of the regional parks working together have preserved over 12,000 acres of rolling and wooded Virginia countryside for you and created a priceless legacy for future generations.

Through your regional parks, NOVA Parks provides almost two million citizens with some of the finest recreational facilities in the country. By pooling their funds, these local governments find that each dollar they contribute to NOVA Parks is multiplied by contributions from other member jurisdictions and sometimes augmented even more by state and federal grants and private donations. Being a member of NOVA Parks is a good economic investment.

From a wavepool to nature trails, from golfing to boating, there's a regional park that is just right for you. Come for the day, a weekend or a week. The NOVA Parks are yours to enjoy!

- New septic system at Mt. Defiance Historic Park has been installed and is operational. Site work to bury lines and grade the landscape is ongoing.
- · Mt. Zion hosted its first Fourth Sunday Tour of 2025 on May 25 with 25 visitors.
- · Volunteer-led tours contributed 10 volunteer hours.
- The Goose Creek Bridge Study Report is underway with a survey of the structure being conducted with a report on proposed treatments to follow.

- · Launched the summer park season with a fully booked Memorial Day weekend across all picnic shelters.

Winkler Botanical Preserve - Rachel Doody, Park Manager



- · Participated in the annual Memorial Day Parade in Falls Church.
















ABOUT NOVA PARKS

In the late 1950's, the Northern Virginia Planning District Commission and a group of citizens from several local jurisdictions came together to protect Northern Virginia's rich heritage of woods, meadows, lakes and streams from the threat of suburban sprawl. These citizens, working with their local governments--Fairfax County, Arlington County and the City of Falls Church--organized under the Virginia Park Authorities Act in 1959 as the Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority (NVRPA). They came together to plan, acquire develop and operate a system of regional parks for all Northern Virginians to enjoy.

Today, NOVA Parks (as the organization came to be known in 2014) represents three counties and three cities -- Arlington County, Fairfax County, Loudoun County, the City of Alexandria, the City of Falls Church and the City of Fairfax. NOVA Parks staff, volunteer board members appointed from each jurisdiction and many friends of the regional parks working together have preserved over 12,000 acres of rolling and wooded Virginia countryside for you and created a priceless legacy for future generations.

Through your regional parks, NOVA Parks provides almost two million citizens with some of the finest recreational facilities in the country. By pooling their funds, these local governments find that each dollar they contribute to NOVA Parks is multiplied by contributions from other member jurisdictions and sometimes augmented even more by state and federal grants and private donations. Being a member of NOVA Parks is a good economic investment.

From a wavepool to nature trails, from golfing to boating, there's a regional park that is just right for you. Come for the day, a weekend or a week. The NOVA Parks are yours to enjoy!
